Organized Retail Theft (O.R.T.) is a term we never used to hear and an act we rarely used to see. Shoplifting was enshrined into law as a crime in 2014, when California voters passed Proposition 47. Prop 47 reduces the penalties for a number of drug and theft crimes. Until the passage of Prop 47, prosecutors would usually charge shoplifters under the state's burglary laws — which carried felony penalties of up to six years in prison. Now, many of these crimes are misdemeanors and the penalties, if there are any, can be only a small fine or community service.

Many district attorneys see rehabilitation rather than incarceration as the answer to crimes big and small. This must provide some incentive for someone weighing the costs/benefits of committing a crime.

Burglaries are on the rise as well as these offenses frequently result in minimal punishment.
